An Articulation Agreement Between Spokane Community College and

The Board of Trustees of Illinois State University

Spokane Community College (SCC) and The Board of Trustees of Illinois State University (ISU) hereby form a cooperative relationship through this articulation agreement to better serve our public constituents, to smooth the transfer process, to minimize duplication of instruction and to build on community college and university learning experiences. Both institutions recognize that by working together, their collective efforts are stronger than their individual efforts.

The two institutions agree to the following:

- Students who successfully complete the Health Information Management (HIM) program and all other
 appropriate requirements for an Associates of Applied Science (AAS) Degree at SCC and meet all general ISU
 and program admission criteria will be admitted to ISU, and generally, would be placed at the junior level.
- 2. Acceptance into a specific ISU degree program is based on each individual transfer student meeting the conditions and considerations listed for that program. Specifically, students successfully completing a HIM program and all other appropriate requirements for an AAS Degree at SCC, prescribed in Exhibit A attached, will be admitted to the Baccalaureate Health Informatics and Management program at ISU, subject to available capacity in the degree program. The minimum cumulative transfer GPA for admission to the Health Informatics and Management program at ISU is 2.25.
- 3. The courses listed in the attached Exhibit A prescribe the SCC Health Information Management (HIM) program courses that have been reviewed and accepted for transfer to ISU as part of the B.S. in Health Informatics and Management program. Students will meet all ISU graduation requirements, including General Education, AMALI, and IDEAS requirements, as a condition of receiving an ISU B.S. in Health Informatics and Management HIM degree.
- 4. Relationships between SCC and ISU faculty and administration are in the spirit of cooperation and provide the basis of this agreement.
- 5. Representatives of both institutions agree to meet on a regular basis, but at least every other year, to assess curricular changes and other conditions that may affect the nature of the agreement.
- 6. This agreement does not preclude either institution from making curriculum changes. The other party will be notified of any such curriculum changes.
- 7. Subject to review and approval by both parties, appropriate publications and promotional materials regarding this agreement will be made available to all SCC students with interest in the program.
- 8. Either ISU or SCC may terminate this agreement by giving one year's advance notice to the cooperating institution's chief academic officer. All students admitted to ISU or enrolled at ISU at the time such termination becomes effective shall be permitted the opportunity to complete their degree or program upon such terms and conditions as were in effect at the time such student was admitted.
- 9. This agreement is effective with the 2023-2024 academic year and is subject to renewal every other year for a total period not to exceed ten 10 years, unless terminated in accordance with paragraph 8 above.

- 10. It is understood and agreed that neither party to this Agreement shall be legally liable for any negligent or wrongful acts, either of commission or omission, of the other, unless such liability is imposed by law and this Agreement shall not be construed as seeking to either enlarge or diminish any obligation or duty owed by one party against the other or against third parties.
- 11. Both parties agree to comply with all applicable federal and state nondiscrimination, equal opportunity and affirmative action laws, orders and regulations. Neither party shall engage in unlawful discrimination or harassment against any person because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religion, pregnancy, sexual orientation, order of protection, gender identity and expression, age, marital status, disability, genetic information, unfavorable military discharge, status as a veteran, or sex including sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.
- 12. The relationship of each party to the other under this Agreement shall be that of independent contractor, and no employment, partnership or joint venture relationship shall be created by the entry into or performance of this Agreement by the parties.
- 13. Both parties affirm that, to the best of its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict between such party's family, business, or financial interests and its obligations under this Agreement; and, in the event of a change in either its private interests or obligations under this Agreement, and such party will raise to the other any questions regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change.
- 14. This Agreement may not be assigned by either party without the prior written consent of the other party. Such consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. This Agreement, attachments, and incorporated references shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the content of said Agreement. This Agreement may not be amended by either party unless such amendment is mutually acceptable to both parties and is reduced to writing and signed by both parties.
- 15. The failure of either party to enforce any provision hereof shall not be construed as a waiver of such party's right to enforce such provisions in the future. In the event that any provision of this Agreement shall be held to be void, voidable or otherwise unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Illinois, without regard to the conflicts of laws. Any dispute arising hereunder shall be brought only in the appropriate courts located in Illinois. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, including by facsimile signature, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of which together shall constitute a single instrument.
- 16. Confidentiality. Both ISU and SCC may receive confidential student information as a result of participation associated with this Articulation Agreement. ISU and SCC agree to abide by the student protections as outlined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act.
- 17. Any notice required hereunder shall be deemed given when delivered in person or three 3 days after being sent by first class mail to the following addresses, which may be changed by notice provided pursuant to this Agreement:

If a student completes the Health Information Management (HIM) program and all other appropriate requirements for an Associates of Applied Science (AAS) Degree at Spokane Community College and is admitted to Illinois State University, that student shall be eligible for this Articulation Agreement.

- 1. This Articulation Agreement is only appropriate for students who transfer from Spokane Community College with an AAS Degree in Health Information Management and pursue a Bachelor of Science Degree in Health Informatics and Management, RHIT to HIM online sequence, from Illinois State University.
- 2. These students must complete the requirements for the AAS degree in Health InformationManagement from Spokane Community College as detailed in this agreement.
- 3. Prior to enrolling in major sequence courses at Illinois State University, students must complete, at minimum, 15 credit hours toward the Illinois Articulation Initiative General Education Core Curriculum IAI GECC. It is strongly recommended that the 15 hours include the Communications category, the Math category, and at least one of the required courses in the Science category. Remaining courses required to complete IAI GECC may be completed after students have begun major sequence courses at Illinois State University. Transferable courses from Spokane Community College are outlined below.
